Intro: I cant believe you all are still here...

we are essentially at the half-way point in this scariest book of the Bible and its time to asses where we are - video

Problem:

Revelation can be hard to bear - Rev 9:1-21 but we have been blessed -Rev 1:1-3; 22:7

Main Idea:

with a reignited perspective and a reignited certainty to bear a reignited burden

Implication: Ezek 2:1-3:15

but here is the burden - as we love people and share the gospel they will be offended at us

Jesus was not crucified for telling people to be nice - that is not the gospel He was crucified for implying that people are not nice

Christ is the stumbling stone to the "good people" of this world and the gospel is by its very necessity offensive to self- righteous people among us - Rom 9:30-33

Revelation reminds us of this - it is the unveiling of the Lamb in His glory and His righteous wrath

Revelation makes it impossible to remain causal and ambivalent about the gospel- all our fake plastic versions of Jesus are burned up in the furnace of this book all our ambivalence consumed by the terror we find within

Application: Ezek 3:16-21

there is an analogy of experience here setting the tone for us we are watchmen on the wall - Ezek 3:16-21 how much do we have to hate a person to ignore this book?

Rev. 10:5 And the angel whom I saw standing on the sea and on the land raised his right hand to heaven

Rev. 10:6 and **swore by him who lives** forever and ever, who created heaven and what is in it, the earth and what is in it, and the sea and what is in it, **that there would be no more delay**,

Rev. 10:7 but that in the days of the trumpet call to be sounded by the seventh angel, the mystery of God would be fulfilled, just as he announced to his servants the prophets.

prophets - OT last 3.5 years

Rev 11:1-3; 12:6, , 12, 14; 13:5
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to bear a reignited burden

Rev. 10:8 ¶ Then the voice that I had heard from heaven spoke to me again, saying, "Go, **take the scroll** that is open in the hand of the angel who is standing on the sea and on the land."

Rev. 10:9 So I went to the angel and told him to give me the little scroll. And he said to me, "Take and eat it; it will make your stomach bitter, but in your mouth it will be sweet as honey."

Rev. 10:10 And I took the little scroll from the hand of the angel and ate it. **It was** sweet as honey in my mouth, but when I had eaten it my stomach was made bitter.

Rev. 10:11 And I was told, "You must again prophesy about many peoples and nations and languages and kings."
