

## How to See Scripture: The Four Stages of Biblical Sight

### 4. Unconscious Competence — “It just comes alive. The connections speak.”

This is where the Word begins to open itself. Not because we're clever—but because we've been formed. Structure, rhythm, repetition, and tone start to emerge on their own. We're not just interpreting anymore—we're beholding. The Word is thinking us into its shape.

Wherever you are in this process, keep going. Stay immersed in the Word. Ask better questions. Read slowly. Listen deeply. Over time, the Spirit trains your eyes. And what once felt like mystery will become worship.

You won't just understand the Bible. You'll begin to see the mind of God.
